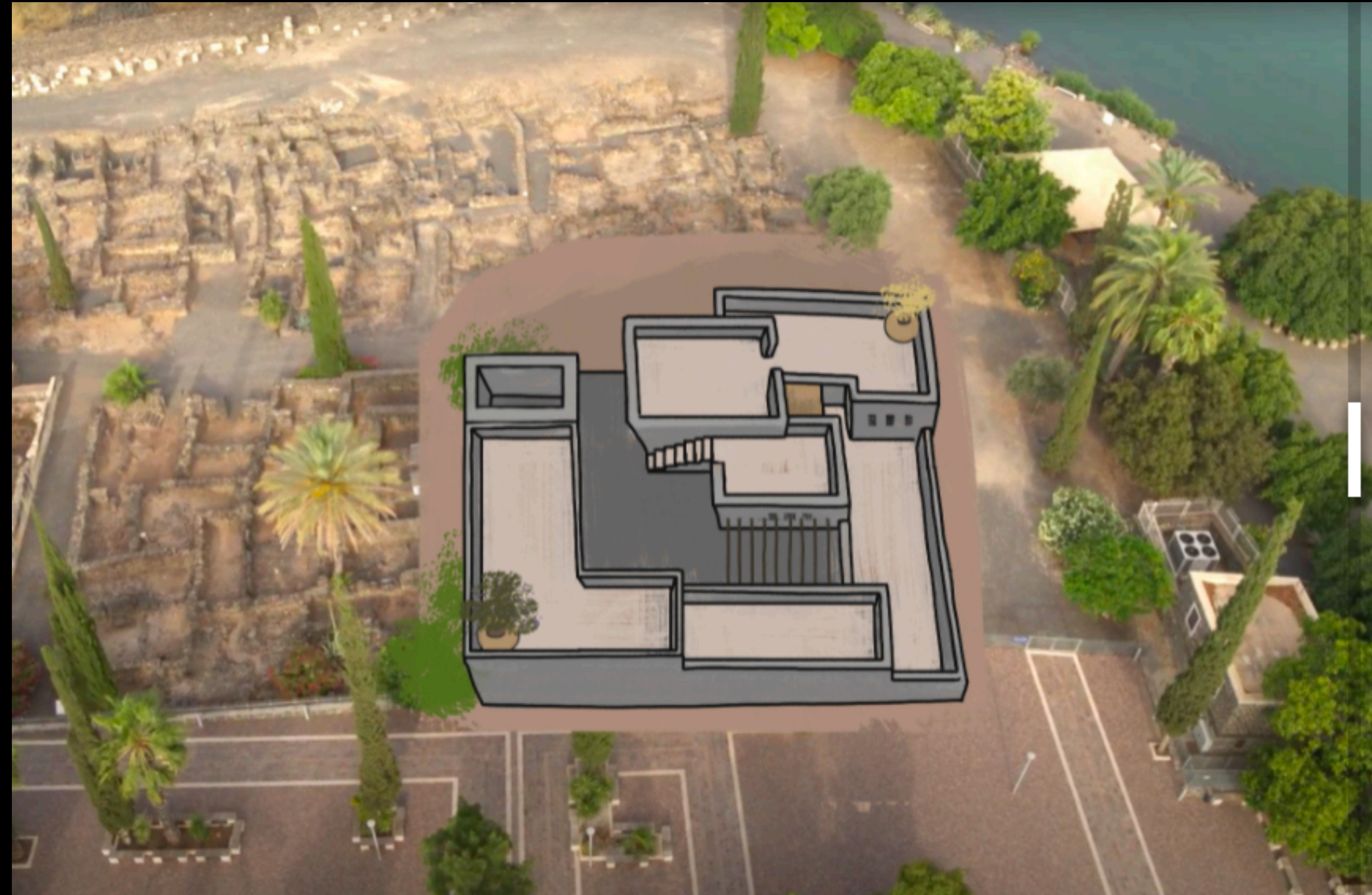

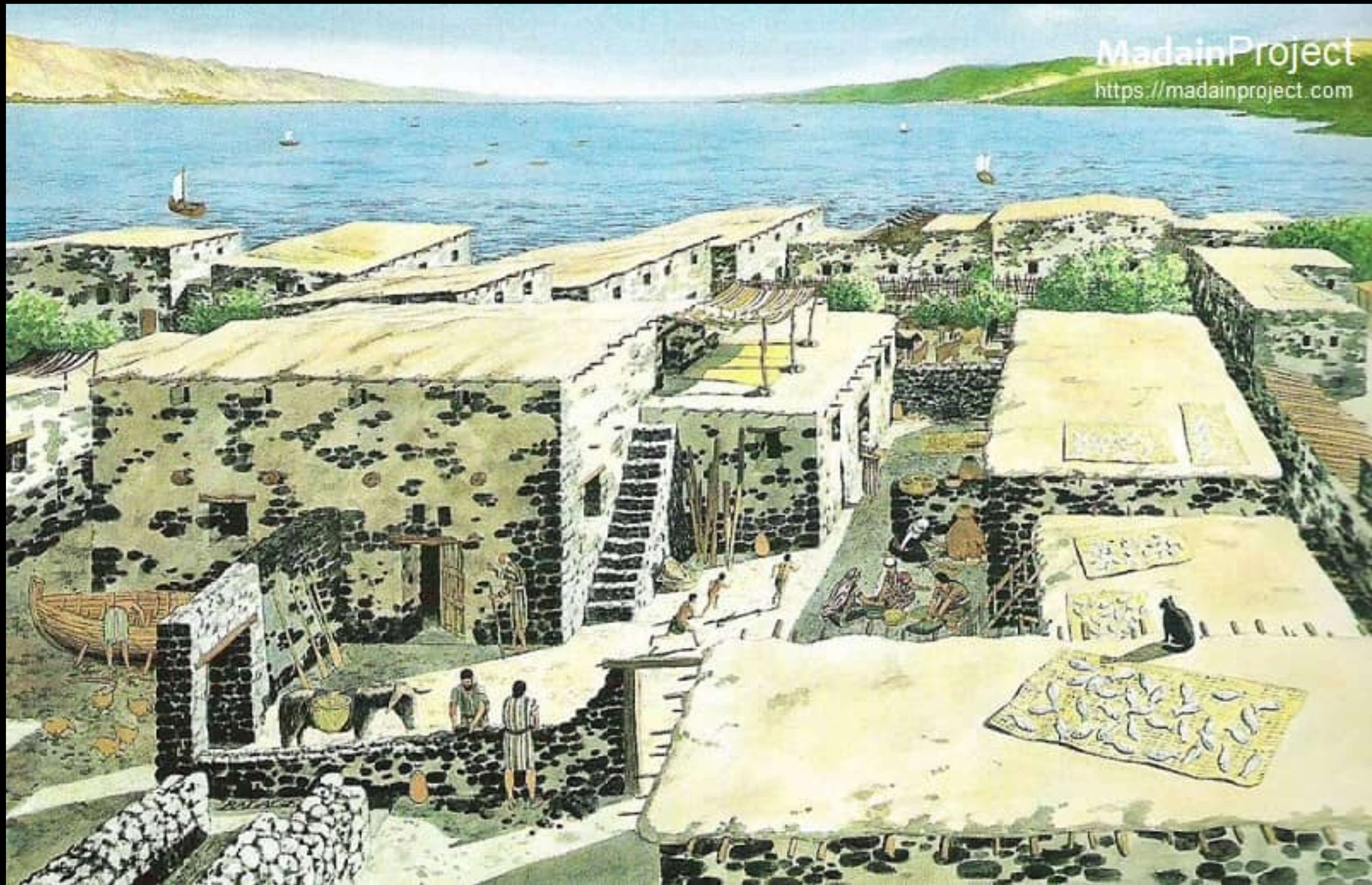

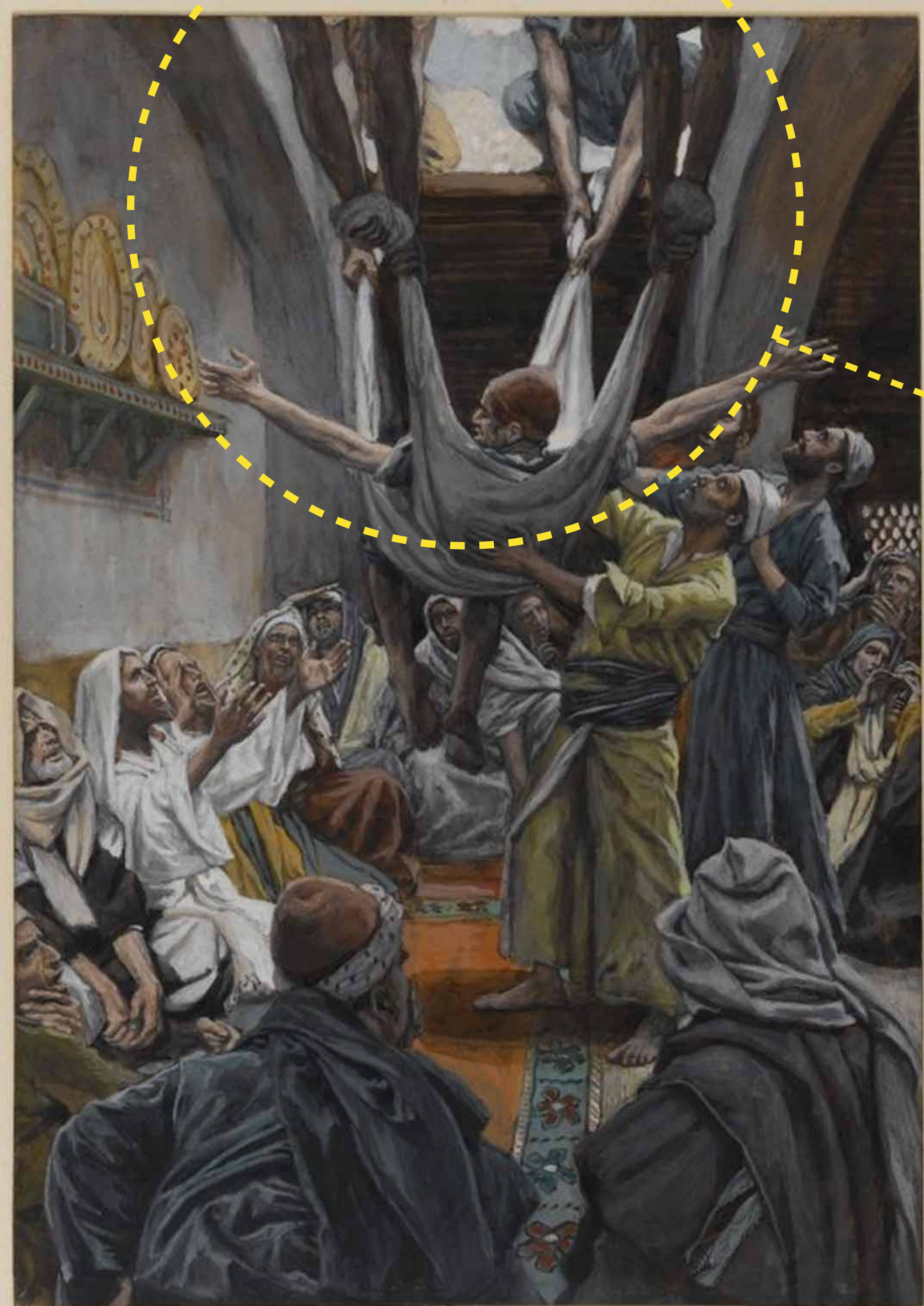

English	“Son, your sins are <u>forgiven</u> .”
Hebrew	“Nislechu lecha chatoteicha” <i><u>Forgiven</u> are you sins</i>

Hebrew word for “forgiven” is salach regarding God
being the one who is forgiving someone

Forgiven is he/ Forgiven are his sins.

Leviticus 4:26 And he shall offer all its fat up in smoke on the altar as in the case of the fat of the sacrifice of peace offerings. So the priest shall make atonement for him regarding his sin, and he will be forgiven

Leviticus 4:31 Then he shall remove all its fat, just as the fat was removed from the sacrifice of peace offerings; and the priest shall offer it up in smoke on the altar as a soothing aroma to the Lord. So the priest shall make atonement for him, and he will be forgiven.

Leviticus 4:35 Then he shall remove all its fat, just as the fat of the lamb is removed from the sacrifice of the peace offerings, and the priest shall offer ^{it} up in smoke on the altar, on the offerings by fire to the Lord. So the priest shall make atonement for him regarding his sin which he has ^{committed}, and he will be forgiven.
